Scripture Readings Epistle/Apostol:

2 Corinthians 4:6-15 Galatians 2:16-20

Gospel:

Matthew 22:35-46 Mark 8:34-9:1

Apolytikion/Troparion – T6/Pl 2

The angelic powers were at Your tomb; the guards became as dead men.

Mary stood by Your grave, seeking Your most pure body.

You captured Hell, not being tempted by it. You came to the Virgin, granting life.

O Lord, Who rose from the dead, glory to You.

Kontakion – Tone 6 / Plagal 2

When Christ God the Giver of Life, raised all of the dead from the valleys of misery with His mighty hand, He bestowed resurrection on the human race.

He is the Savior of all, the Resurrection, the Life, and the God of all.

Questions for Your Kids

- Why do you think the cross is so important for us as Orthodox Christians?
- How does this show that God loves us?
- What can we do to be like God?

The cross is our symbol of victory

- What do we say when we make the sign of the cross on our body?
- What do our fingers represent when we make the sign of the cross?
- If we bow down before the cross, Who are we worshipping? (Hint, it's not the cross....)
- How many places do we see the cross in church? at home? in our daily lives?

- Why do you think St. Juvenaly is important for us today?
- What does it mean to be a martyr for Christ?

- What can we do to be like the saints who labored here in North America?
- Who do we know that is godly and saintly in our lives?

Use as many or as few of the questions and discussion topics to help children learn about the feast while discovering how the Orthodox Faith can be a part of their daily life.
